Hence, adequate investment and long-term policy planning are essential for the successful implementation of psychological approaches within criminal justice institutions.

Results & Discussion

Despite these advantages, the results reveal that criminal psychology remains inadequately developed within Pakistan's criminal justice institutions. A shortage of trained forensic psychologists and mental health professionals continues to limit the effective application of psychological expertise. Weak collaboration between legal institutions and mental health specialists further hinders the integration of interdisciplinary approaches. Moreover, the absence of standardized psychological assessment tools creates challenges in ensuring consistency and reliability in evaluations. Limited psychological infrastructure in courts and correctional facilities also restricts access to professional services and rehabilitation programs. Resource constraints and inadequate funding have emerged as major obstacles to institutional development. Social stigma surrounding mental health issues additionally

discourages the acceptance and utilization of psychological interventions within the justice system. The discussion indicates that these challenges are particularly pronounced in developing countries where institutional capacities remain limited. Nevertheless, international experiences demonstrate that the incorporation of psychological principles enhances the effectiveness and fairness of criminal justice administration. The findings suggest that Pakistan can benefit significantly from adopting similar approaches through policy reforms and institutional strengthening. Investment in forensic psychology departments and specialized training programs is essential for addressing existing deficiencies. Collaboration between legal professionals, psychologists, psychiatrists, and medical experts should be encouraged to promote interdisciplinary cooperation. Universities and research institutions should also contribute to the development of indigenous psychological assessment tools and evidence-based practices. Public awareness campaigns are necessary to reduce stigma associated with mental health and psychological treatment. Strengthening rehabilitation programs within correctional institutions would further improve offender management and reintegration outcomes. The study concludes that criminal psychology provides an indispensable framework for understanding the behavioral and psychological dimensions of crime. Its integration into legal processes promotes more accurate investigations, fair sentencing, and effective rehabilitation. A balanced criminal justice system should therefore combine legal principles with psychological knowledge to achieve equitable and humane outcomes. Such an approach would not only enhance the administration of justice but also contribute to crime prevention and social stability. Ultimately, the effective integration of criminal psychology into Pakistan's criminal justice system has the potential to strengthen institutional efficiency, protect human rights, and promote a more responsive and modern system of justice.

Similarly, addressing psychological motivations through counseling and rehabilitation programs contributes to long-term crime reduction. The integration of criminal psychology into correctional systems enhances the prospects of offender reform and social reintegration. Evidence-based approaches provide more reliable outcomes than punitive measures alone. In this regard, Pakistan's criminal justice institutions must adopt innovative and research-oriented policies. Greater investment in psychological services and forensic expertise is necessary for achieving sustainable reforms.
